The 5th International Conference on Comparative Education and Teacher Training organized by the Bulgarian Comparative Education Society will be held in Sofia, 28-31 August 2007. It is planned to be held in the week just before the 13th World Congress of the World Council of Comparative Education Societies in Sarajevo, Bosnia and Herzegovina, 3-7 September 2007 in order to give participants an excellent opportunity for combining both events.

The deadline for registration and submitting papers is 20 April 2007.

Transportation to Sarajevo: The BCES will arrange bus or train transport to Sarajevo, Bosnia and Herzegovina, for these participants who want to attend the 13th World Congress of the WCESS. The trip usually takes 7 hours. The price of this trip is not included in the conference fee and additional payment is required.
